#### William Pryor...

...called the Violence Against Women Act unconstitutional, arguing that this federal civil rights protection violated states' rights.

...used his office as Alabama Attorney General to promote his conservative political agenda, specifically that government and fundamentalist religion should work hand-in-hand.

...argued against legislation protecting the rights of millions of people in the U.S. like the Voting Rights Act, Age Discrimination in Employment Act, Americans with Disabilities Act and the Family and Medical Leave Act.

...called *Roe v. Wade* "the worst abomination in the history of Constitutional Law."

#### Janice Rogers Brown...

...said senior citizens use Social Security to "blithely cannibalize their grandchildren because they have a right to get as much "free" stuff as the political system will permit them to extract."

...showed her opposition to affirmative action in her 2000 ruling that upheld a ban on preferential treatment for women and minorities in public contracts, hiring and college admissions.

...dissented from a majority opinion in a case regarding the use of racial slurs in the workplace, arguing that the First Amendment protects the use of racial slurs in the workplace, even when it involves illegal race discrimination.

...called the court's invalidation of parental consent "an excellent example of the folly of courts in the role of philosopher kings."
